GENERAL INTRODUCTORY MATTERS

- Each day begins at 9.05am. You are expected to arrive at school no earlier than 8.30am, when minimal supervision begins.
- If you are late to school, you will need to report to the Attendance Window (located in the Front Office) and sign in.
- If you need to attend a medical appointment during school hours, you will need to bring a note from home
 explaining the reason and obtain a pass out from the Attendance Window (attend to this BEFORE school
 starts).
- If you become ill at school during class time, ask your teacher for a note to report to Sick Bay. During Recess/Lunch report to Sick Bay directly. Sick Bay is located at the half door/photocopying office in D Block (if unattended report to the Front Office). Your parent/carer will be contacted regarding your visit to Sick Bay.
- A Year Assembly is held in Week B. Year 7 meet in the MPC with their Year Advisers Mr Maginnity and Mrs Blackburn.
- A book pack of workbooks and equipment needed for Year 7, 2021 is available from the canteen. This book pack is available from the canteen from 1 December 2020.
- Textbooks will be lent to you in some subjects. Please look after them. The loan of textbooks is contained within the school fee structure.
- School fees should be paid to the Front Office as soon as possible.
- Formal reports to parents/carers, on your progress at school are made in Term 1, Term 2 and Term 4. Parent Teacher Interview occurs just after the release of reports to students (dates to be advised via School Newsletter/School Notice Board).
- School uniform must be worn every day. If there is a problem with your uniform, you are expected to bring a note from home explaining the concern. If families are experiencing difficulty with purchasing a school uniform, a Student Assistance Scheme form is available from the Front Office to support families.
- New uniforms or second-hand uniforms can be purchased from the canteen.
- The canteen will be open during the holidays on 20, 21 and 22 January 2021 from 8am to 2pm to assist parents with purchasing book packs or school uniforms.
- Each day, lunch can be purchased from the school canteen. Orders can be placed before school or at Recess.

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE (BYOD) CHROMEBOOK PROGRAM

Grafton High School introduced a new Chromebook BYOD program in 2015. In this time, we have seen student groups gain competence in study-based communication using technology. This is a valuable skill for students to use in education and in life.

Our BYOD Chromebook program includes year 7 to year 12.

Grafton High School has a 5GHz Wireless (Internet) system. This has been upgraded to include indoor and outdoor wireless connectivity via a stable, state of the art Aruba WIFI network. Wireless connectivity allows GHS students to work anywhere in the school. This gives GHS students instant access to an ever-expanding range of digital learning units.

Why Chrome and Why Chromebooks?

- Any kind of Chromebook will work on our WIFI network and connect to our GHS Google domain.
- Chromebooks run on the FREE Chrome operating system.
- Inside Chrome there is Google Workspace (formerly called G-Suite).
 Workspace allows student s to use a suite of online software that save instantly but can also be used offline and saved later. Google Workspace allows students and teachers to collaborate in real time.



- When connected to our system, the Chromebook gets education level filtering applied and all software gets auto updates from the school.
- If the Chromebook is lost, it can be shut down by the school.
- All school Desktops can run the Chrome APP and students can access their saved Chrome Workspace files.

Where to buy a Chromebook.

You are welcome to purchase Chromebooks from any retailer online or locally. Any Chromebook will work on our system.











Why Google Chrome?

Google Chrome is an integral part of our BYOD program because students can access their information anywhere there is a wireless internet connection. This means that students can access their data from Desktops in the school, Chromebooks or any device that has Google. Students can log into their GHS Google Account anywhere at any time and access, share and collaborate.

If anything happens to a device, data is not lost because it is stored in our own managed GHS GOOGLE drive.

Google Chrome allows student groups and their Teachers at GHS to use Google Drive and Google Apps in the Google Workspace to share and collaborate in the teaching and creation of resources and tasks.



Students can access their GHS Google Workspace documents from home, school or wherever there is a Wireless (internet) connection.











Chromebooks allow instant access, longer battery life and should a student leave, the device can be returned as a normal Chromebook.

Once it is set up to work in the school students can:

- Participate online in classes
- Share work
- Collaborate with classmates and with teachers

The Chromebook will:

- Run the Grafton High School Google Domain (GHS)
- If lost can be deactivated with a screen message asking for it to be returned to Grafton High School
- When found- can be reactivated and will work as normal
- Have filtered WIFI student access
- Last all day with no need to charge (Chargers are not permitted at school)

Chromebook Parent info sessions:

We run sessions for parents every year. Information on Chromebook nights will be released closer to the time.

Chromebook Student sessions:

At the start of the year students are introduced to Chromebooks and how to access the Google Workspace.

Chromebook Class sets:

Grafton High School have Chromebook class sets in carts in each faculty. The class sets enhance the BYOD program to ensure when we have tests and class work that all students can access a Chromebook.

Year 7 has their own special area in which to sit and have their breaks in the W Block Quad.


No food is to be eaten on the school oval. Students are only allowed onto the oval during breaks after eating areas are free from rubbish and two bells have been rung.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Students must by law attend school each day it is open. If students are unable to attend for some reason then the following procedures should be followed:

A Parent/Carer should notify the school by telephone, email, or fax before 10:00 am on the day of absence to prevent an SMS or letter being sent home. Following an absence from school, a verbal or written explanation must be provided within 7 days. Alternatively, a parent/carer can respond to the absence notification text.

Principals may decline to accept an explanation that you have provided if they do not believe the absence is in the best interest of your child. In these circumstances your child's absence would be recorded as unjustified.

Written explanation notes should be handed in at the Attendance Window which is at the Front Office. Notes must clearly state: student's full given name and surname, year, date or dates absent, reason for absence and signed by parent or guardian.

NB: There is a form available from school (see below). This form ensures all necessary information is included and assists in the filing of notes. Please use it whenever possible.

If a student is going to be absent for any day please notify the school. This can be done by:

- Telephoning 6642 3355
- Emailing the School grafton-h.school@det.nsw.edu.au
- Delivering or sending a note to the Attendance Window at the Front Office.

If a student is to be absent for a period of greater than 20 school days then parents need to apply for an exemption from attendance through the Front Office.

Students who arrive late to school must report to the Attendance Window, preferably with a note from their parent/carer stating the reason for being late. They will then be issued with a Late Arrival slip. Students will not be admitted to class unless they produce this Late Arrival slip.

Students who wish to leave the school during the day must bring a note from home requesting permission to do so. This note must be submitted before school, at recess or lunch before the pass out can be issued. Students must be signed out at the Attendance Window before leaving and signed in at the Attendance Window when they return to school.

The procedures outlined are designed for the safety and welfare of all students, to reduce the level of truancy and to assist the running of the school.

ASSESSMENT AND REPORTS

Students are assessed on a combination of assignments, and tests. In Year 7 three reports will be issued: an Interim report during Term 1; Mid Course report for Term 2; and, the Yearly report in Term 4.

Homework is an essential part of the school's education program. As well as providing for both revision and extension of work done in class, it is intended to develop self-organisation and independent work habits in students. Students who follow a regular homework/study program throughout the year perform better in exams than those who leave study until the last minute.

COMMUNICATION AND PARENT/TEACHER INTERVIEWS

There are a number of ways in which parents can find out what is happening in the school and seek answers to any concerns.

- The School Newsletter is published and is distributed by email. A hard copy is always available for students, parents and carers at the Front Office. It is also published on the Grafton High School website. It celebrates student and school achievements and provides up to date information on school activities. Please ensure your contact details are up to date including your email address.
- Facebook is a quick and easy forum where we like to connect with our school community. We post and share the amazing things our students achieve, videos of the high school experience, inform parents/carers of upcoming events, when excursions are due to leave and arrive back home, and reiterate information handed out to students or in the newsletter. "Like" the Grafton High School Facebook page to view posts, photos and videos about the creative and talented students we have here at GHS.
- Parent/teacher afternoons: Parents are encouraged to attend these sessions to discuss their child's progress. They occur after reports are issued for Term 1 Interim for Year 7 only and Mid Course. You will be notified of the date and time via the School's Newsletter, Website and Facebook Page.
- Direct contact with individual teachers: Please feel free to call or email class teachers about specific subject issues. The Head Teacher of each particular subject area is also available and their names can be found in this booklet.
- Wellbeing concerns: Mr Maginnity your Year Adviser, Mrs Blackburn, your Assistant Year Adviser and Mrs Nichols, Head Teacher Wellbeing, are the people you call. Your Deputy Principal has the overall responsibility for welfare and discipline issues of Year 7 students.
- Learning and Support Teacher: Ms Heath provides direct assistance to students in regular classes who have additional learning needs in conjunction with regular classroom teachers. Parents who have concerns about their child's progress should contact their subject teacher or Mr Maginnity, Mrs Blackburn or Mrs Nichols.
- Communication with your son/daughter/ward during school hours: If you need to contact your child urgently, please call the Front Office staff for assistance. With the implementation of Yondr mobile phone pouches, students will not have access to their phones until the end of the day.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL



Representatives from Year 7 are elected to the SRC in Term 1. The SRC is elected annually by the students.

CURRICULUM

English Students will develop skills in reading, writing, listening, speaking and

viewing. In a wide range of language situations, they will make meaning of what is said, how it is said, why it is said, and the worth of what is said. Language competence will be seen in the contexts of everyday

communication, personal expression, literature and multi media.

English also involves students working on tasks at home.

Mathematics The syllabus in Year 7 covers the areas of:

Problem-solving, Geometry, Measuring, Statistics, Numbers, Algebra. In Year 7, the students consolidate their basic number skills as tools for later study in Mathematics. Students also have access to Education Perfect as

a home study tool.

Science Throughout the year, students will develop knowledge, understanding and

skills in applying the processes of working scientifically. They will be required to plan, conduct and report on practical experiences as well as develop critical problem solving skills. Students will start Year 7 learning the basic skills needed to work scientifically and then progress through the topics of Matter and Heat, Mixtures, Classification, Introduction to Ecosystems, Forces, Space and Amazing Cells throughout the year.

Students will complete a range of assessment tasks including Practical

Tests, Theory Tests, and an Arthropod Research Task.

History Students will study History in Semester 1.

Students will study how archaeologists investigate history; learn to use terms and concepts relating to historical time and how sources are used by historians. They will investigate the societies of ancient Egypt and China using a range of archaeological and written sources. Students will conduct

a local site study.

Geography Students will study Geography in Semester 2.

Geography aims to instil in its students a love of the environment. Students look at 21st Century issues like water scarcity and urban living. Students

also have the opportunity to conduct fieldwork and use mapping skills.

Languages Japanese and French are studied as a cultural awareness program in

preparation for language selection in Year 8.

PDHPE Personal Development, Health and Physical Education

The **Physical Education** component focuses explicitly on the value of movement, physical literacy and skill development. It concentrates on developing movement skills students need to participate in physical

activities with confidence, creativity and competence.

Health provides an opportunity for students to build knowledge and enhance their ability to understand and use health information and services to promote and maintain health, safety and wellbeing.

Integrated Sport enables students to participate in a variety of movement contexts in a specialised environment where movement skills can be practised and refined.

Creative and Performing Arts

Visual Arts - Students explore and develop their awareness of how they visually interpret their world through:

- Artmaking: drawing, painting, printmaking, sculpture and ceramics
- Art Study: investigating ways in which other artists interpret their world

Technology Mandatory

CAPA

Technology Mandatory engages students in design and production activities as they develop solutions to identified needs and opportunities. Through the practical application of knowledge and understanding they learn about Agriculture and Food Technologies, Digital Technologies, Engineered Systems and Material Technologies.

Students develop knowledge and understanding of the four Technology contexts through the Design and Production of solutions to meet identified needs or opportunities.

In Agriculture and Food Technologies students learn about the processes of food and fibre production and investigate the innovative and sustainable supply of agriculturally produced raw materials. Students are provided with opportunities to develop knowledge and understanding about food selection and preparation, food safety and how to make informed choices when experimenting with and preparing nutritious food.

The Digital Technologies context encourages students to develop an empowered attitude towards digital technologies, use abstractions to represent and deconstruct real-world problems, and implement and evaluate digital solutions. Students have the opportunity to become innovative creators of digital technologies in addition to effective users of digital systems and critical consumers of the information they convey. Students are provided with opportunities to develop fluency in a general-purpose programming language and use these skills to solve information problems and to automate repetitive tasks.

The Engineered Systems context focuses on how force, motion and energy can be used in systems, machines and structures. Students are provided with opportunities to experiment and develop prototypes to test their solutions. They are led to understand how forces and the properties of materials affect the behaviour and performance of engineered systems, machines and structures. Knowledge of these principles and systems enables the design and production of sustainable, engineered solutions.

The Material Technologies context focuses on the application of specialist skills and techniques to a broad range of traditional, contemporary and advancing materials. Students develop knowledge and understanding of the characteristics and properties of a range of materials through research, experimentation and practical investigation. These are applied when they produce products to satisfy identified needs and opportunities.

STEM

The STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) subject is a cross-curricular class where students will undertake projects that incorporate parts of the Science, Mandatory Technology and Mathematics syllabus. This subject is designed to engage students' interest in STEM-related fields and improves students' problem-solving and critical-analysis skills. Students will undertake STEM projects both individually as well as in small groups within their class. Within these projects students will follow the STEM process of research, understand, design, test, analyse and evaluate and document their learning through a digital portfolio. Projects that students may undertake include robotics and coding, bridge construction, electronic car design and racing.

It is expected that all students entering Year 7 will satisfactorily complete a four year course resulting in the award of a Record of School Achievement (RoSA) at the end of Year 10. Satisfactory attendance and good behaviour are essential if the RoSA is to be awarded.

GIFTED AND TALENTED STUDENTS

The needs of Gifted and Talented students are met in many ways at Grafton High School. The Selective Class provides an opportunity for students identified as academically talented to work at a challenging standard. Places in this class are determined by state-wide testing. Our Gold Standard classes offer opportunities for students who have demonstrated a high level of commitment and motivation to learn. Students must apply through the school to be placed in a Gold Standard class. Teachers of Gold Standard classes are committed to provide a range of interesting extension activities to challenge and inspire students. Students in a Gold Standard class will set a high standard in attendance, classwork, behaviour, homework completion and organisation. Selective and Gold Standard students will be expected to participate in a range of activities outside of the classroom.

All students are encouraged to enter a wide range of School, Regional, State and National competitions, plus become involved in the extracurricular activities mentioned in this booklet.







SUPPORT UNIT

Grafton High School Support Unit provides the opportunity for eligible students to access enrolment in an IO/AU, IO/IS or IM support class or MC program.

Grafton High School Support Unit is committed to providing a comprehensive education for all its students. Programs focus on learning outcomes in each KLA in Years 7-12 as each student works towards achieving their Higher School Certificate. Each student's program will be designed to meet their individual needs and may involve all mainstream courses, all Lifeskills courses or a mix of mainstream and Lifeskills courses depending on their ability.

Each student's program will also contain an emphasis on an evolving work experience program and may also focus on community-based programs, community leisure programs, living skills and personal management programs all linked to relevant syllabus and curriculum documents.



Spot on Coffee at GHS was introduced in 2011, to provide selected Year 10 students with an opportunity to gain employment experience while studying at school.

The program involves students taking time out of class for four periods per week in order to prepare the coffee for the staff. In addition to this experience, students also gain valuable skills in customer service, counting money, taking orders and book keeping. Adding to the on the job training that the students receive, the program has also seen a dramatic increase in attendance for the students involved, proving that they thoroughly enjoy the challenge.







PRACTICAL SUBJECTS SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

Due to Department of Education and Communities regulations, no student will be able to participate in TAS or Science practical lessons unless they have the following:







Technology and Applied Studies (TAS)

- Long hair tied back
- Leather, covered shoes not soft cotton/canvas, ballerina, plastic shoes or sandals
- Apron, which will be supplied for all practical classes

Positive Behaviour for Learning (PBL)

Grafton High School (GHS) is a PBL School. The five core values of GHS are Safety, Honesty, Acceptance, Responsibility and Effort. Teachers at Grafton High School embrace PBL because it creates a safe and inclusive teaching and learning environment.

The whole school PBL system set up at GHS promotes a positive culture amongst staff and students by providing a model of teaching expected behaviour. Aspects such as connectedness, accountability for actions and mutual respect are foundational skills which are embedded into our core school values of SHARE. All staff and students endeavour to maintain these values at Grafton High School. We aim to ensure our students are model citizens within the school and the broader community.

Students will learn more about how to exemplify these values as well as being rewarded for demonstrating these core school values during their time at GHS. PBL allows students to have consistency across the multitude of subjects. PBL explicitly outlines student expectations in different settings around the school. PBL focuses on being proactive (support) rather than reactive (punishment).

Below is an example of how our core values can be demonstrated in all settings, in the classroom and in the playground.


PBL Rewards

At Grafton High School we recognise the positive achievements of the student body in many areas including academic performance, cultural activities, community service, sport, behaviour, attitude, amongst other aspects of the high school life.

Teachers may recognise consistent performance through a positive entry in our whole school electronic recording system. These are known as positive Sentral entries. Whilst your child is at Grafton High School, you will be able to access the number of positive Sentral entries your child has by logging onto the parent portal of Sentral.

Parent Sentral Portal

From the Parent Portal you will be able to see how many positives your child has for the year across each term. Please take the time to check your child's Sentral entries and discuss with them the possible reasons why they have been entered.



PBL Postcards

To celebrate students making a sustained effort each term, when students receive 15 Positive Sentral entries a PBL postcard will be mailed home.

Students can receive up to 4 postcards per year (1 per term).



PBL Merit Awards

The Merit System recognises and reinforces student achievement. The aims of the Merit System are to:

- recognise and reward the demonstration of our school values
- encourage all students at varying levels to consistently achieve to the best of their ability
- develop and maintain a cooperative and helpful atmosphere at all times between teachers and students
- encourage participation in a wide variety of classroom, extra-curricular and sporting activities

Students will receive multiple awards during their time at Grafton High School if they consistently demonstrate the expected behaviour. Awards will be presented to students at the end of each term at a whole school assembly. A letter will be sent home inviting parents and carers to attend this assembly (pending COVID restrictions).

Students' Positive Sentral entries will be tallied throughout the year and will be recognised with the following awards:

YEAR GROUP MERIT ASSEMBLIES

Awards presented at the formal year group assemblies are given by teachers for performance in class, for cultural participation, for school service and community service, and for sporting achievement. These awards occur two times annually.



EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

Keep Up Club

Keep Up Club provides students with extra help and resources needed to "keep up" with their homework and assessment tasks. Keep Up Club takes place on Mondays in the Library: before school from 8:30 to 9:00am, and at lunch time from 1:01 to 1:41pm. Students have access to computers, books and printers, as well as teachers to help them complete tasks. Students are always welcome in the library to use the computers and read during the first half of lunch every day. For more information, please see Mrs Lynch (Teacher Librarian).

Debating/Public Speaking

This activity is a lot of fun and available to students from all years. Students participate in competitions organised by the Department of Education and Training and in local competitions. See Mrs Castle or Mr Piper in the English D Block staffroom for more information



Performance Ensembles

Students interested in joining instrumental and vocal groups will have the opportunity to participate in rehearsals. If you play an instrument or sing, see Mr Townley for more information. The school has many performance opportunities for students.

These include the school band that meets every Wednesday 3:30 - 4:30pm in the Music room (A14).

The School Choir meets every week at lunch in the school's Music room (A14).

Instruments are available for hire at a cost of \$20.00 per semester for students who perform in these groups.



WELLBEING TEAM



Head Teacher Wellbeing:

Grafton High School cares about student wellbeing. We will ensure that staff and students are equipped to be able to help students with any problems they may have. Mrs Nichols is your Head Teacher Wellbeing and can be located in the Library (upstairs).

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH AND PHYSICAL EDUCATION AND SPORT


