To celebrate the launch of a new range of innovative degrees, Southern Cross University has an additional 40 new \$2,500 scholarships. The \$100,000 scholarship program will not only help attract talented students to new programs, but also help create a cohort of student leaders ready to contribute to the University and the community. Over the past 18 months the Clarence Valley community held workshops and consultation with industry professionals, service providers and key stakeholders to discuss the higher than state average rates of self-harm. A Steering Committee was formed and led to the development of a plan for improving mental health and wellbeing in the Clarence Valley. This plan was named "Our Healthy Clarence Plan". The 5 objectives of this plan are as follows:

- To improve access for people at risk of self-harm to treatment, crisis care and care after an attempt.
- To improve the ways in which workers and the community respond to people at risk of selfharm.
- To ensure that suitable mental health and wellbeing programs are available in schools.
- 4. To improve community awareness of mental health. This includes how to access information and services.
- To improve our connection with the community. To improve early support for people who are at risk of self-harm and to help prevent self-harm.



About the School Student Transport Scheme

The School Student Transport Scheme

The School Student Transport Scheme (SSTS) provides eligible school students with free or subsidised travel from home to school.

The scheme includes:

- Free travel to and from home and school on approved train, bus, ferry and light rail services during school term.
- Discounted travel on buses between home and school with a School Term Bus Pass.
- Free travel on NSW TrainLink Regional services and long distance coach services for boarding school students.
- Subsidised travel to and from school in private vehicles in areas where there is no public transport available.

Students with a disability who are unable to travel to and from school under the School Student Transport Scheme may be eligible for assistance under the Department of Education Assisted School Travel Program.

What will my free school travel pass look like?

Depending on where they are travelling, students may receive a free school travel pass, School Opal card or both.



School bus passes and School Term Bus Passes are issued by operators to students travelling on buses outside the Opal network. Some operators in rural and regional areas may choose not to issue passes to students.



School Opal cards are issued for free school travel and for School Term Bus Passes by Transport for NSW for travel on trains, buses, light rail and ferries in the Opal network.

Using your school travel pass

School travel passes can only be used for approved travel on school days between the student's home and school/TAFE college between 6.30am and 7pm (6.30am and 9.30pm for TAFE students).

Free school travel passes do not include travel to and from:

- · before and after school care or child-minding premises
- · before and after school activities
- school excursions
- · sports events
- work experience
- · Vocational Education and Training (VET) at a location away from where the student is enrolled
- multi-campus high schools, weekend schools, pre-schools or mini-schools (except for full-time geographically isolated distance education students).
- · Student must comply with the Student Codes of Conduct.

How to apply

Complete the online application form at transportnsw.info/school-students, nominating your home address and which bus company or transport operator the student needs to travel between home and school.

You will receive an email confirming the outcome of your application.
