#### **Principals Report**

My apologies for the delay in the newsletter. We missed last week's deadline as we were in the process of trying to finalise enrolment policy for 2019 and decide on Year 6 students seeking enrolment at Grafton High School in Year 7 next year. I wanted to hold off on publishing this newsletter until I could finalise this process, so I could report back to all parents (see below). I will be asking for this information to be shared across our local primary school newsletters.

#### **Non-Local Enrolments**

After determining anticipated enrolments for 2019, including expressions of interest forms for all Year 6 students moving into Year 7, we have estimated the number of places available, as per the school's enrolment policy. The anticipated enrolment for 2019, excluding non-local students, is currently 932 students.

Grafton High School currently has an enrolment ceiling of 980 students, set by the Department of Education, based on the number of available classroom spaces at the school. Every school is required to set an enrolment buffer to allow enough spare places to enrol any local students starting later in the year. The enrolment buffer for Grafton High school has been set at 5%, or 49 students.

Unfortunately, based on these projected figures, the school has no places available for non-local students in 2019. Where previously, the school has been able to consider enrolment for non-local students with a sibling already at the school or for non-local students who attended a local primary school within our school's drawing area, we now can no longer enrol non-local students based on these criteria. As such, for the remainder of 2018 and moving into 2019, the criteria for non-local enrolment will be:

- medical reasons
- · compassionate circumstances

Only extremely exceptional cases that meet these criteria can be considered by the school enrolment placement panel. When considering an application to enrol, the panel will consider whether any exceptional circumstances/needs can be met elsewhere at the student's local school.

Please be aware that students who gain statewide selective high school entry to the school's Selective Class, or students placed in our Support Unit, automatically gain enrolment, regardless of their residential address, as placement in these classes is determined externally to the school.

Unfortunately, we currently have 47 non-local Year 6 students who have been unsuccessful in gaining enrolment at Grafton High School in 2019. These enrolments were assessed against the non-local criteria published earlier in the year. I realise that this news will be a great disappointment to many families. Given the number of non-local students seeking enrolment and the increasing demand for local student enrolment at Grafton High School, it is unrealistic to maintain a waiting list, as demand far exceeds available places and students on the waiting list would be unlikely to gain enrolment.

As such, I recommend that any Year 6 students who receive notification that they are not successful in gaining enrolment, contact their designated local high school regarding their enrolment for 2019. It is important that these students then participate fully in the transition activities offered by that school.

#### **Grafton Local AECG Meeting**

The Grafton local Aboriginal Education Consultative Group (AECG) will be meeting on June 6 at 1 pm at the Gummyaney Aboriginal Pre-School. All Aboriginal parents and interested community members are invited to attend. The next meeting will include a presentation outlining the NAPLAN assessment to improve parent understanding of the nature of the NAPLAN exam and results.

#### 13 Reasons Why Season 2

#### **HSC Minimum Standards**

Many parents would remember last year when it was announced that a minimum Literacy and Numeracy standard would be introduced in order for a child to receive their Higher School Certificate (HSC). This minimum standard was initially linked to the performance of Year 9 students in NAPLAN. While a student is still able to sit the HSC and even gain university entry without meeting this minimum standard, they will not receive the HSC credential (i.e. the actual award of the Higher School Certificate) if they do not meet the standard. Students can meet this standard at any time up to and

even in the years after they complete the HSC.

Earlier this year the state government announced that the minimum standard would be changed to reflect a separate test of literacy and numeracy proficiency, rather than NAPLAN. This allows students to attempt this test at multiple times up to and beyond their HSC, giving them numerous opportunities to meet the standard. Mrs Martin has already begun organising this testing for our Year 10 students and many will have already completed practice tests in preparation.

For the information of parents and students, I have included a flyer in this newsletter that explains the minimum standard and the online testing.

#### Help-Seeking Built Into Release of 13 Reasons Why

The release of 13 Reasons Why, season 2 will be launched with safe and informative resources in a collaboration between headspace and Netflix.

When Netflix launched the much talked about first series of 13 Reasons Why – a fictional show depicting the death of a teenager by suicide and its impact on those around them – many people the world over were left confronted by the difficult subject matter that the show covered. While it was certainly a conversation starter, there were questions about whether the show prompted discussions about suicide in a helpful way.



Ahead of the second season, the national youth mental health foundation <u>headspace</u> <u>et</u> have teamed up with the global

streaming giant in an effort to generate more helpful conversations about the subject matter.

headspace CEO Jason Trethowan is hoping to take the difficult topics that the show brought into mainstream discussions and encourage a safer, more informed dialogue.

"Our aim is to ensure that young people, parents and schools are supported and equipped to have constructive conversations about the themes that are depicted in the show." Mr Trethowan said.

Alongside warnings and help-seeking information that will be displayed at the start and end of each episode, headspace have developed resources for young people, parents and schools to address the themes depicted in the show. They include advice on viewing the show safely, self-care tips and pointers on how to have difficult conversations.



Conjoint **Associate Professor Josephine Anderson, Clinical Director at the Black Dog Institute**, approves of the move to provide strong resources to teens, parents and teachers when pop culture addresses heavy subjects.

"I think there is a need to react thoughtfully and appropriately to an issue like this. Young people, may be vulnerable to the sensationalising of topics like suicide, especially when portrayed in a TV series or film they are likely to find attractive," said Dr

"On the other hand, we need to dispel the myth that talking about suicide will inevitably harm young people. There is evidence that says that won't happen if the topic is raised in a sensitive fashion."

While there is no way of stopping people from watching the series, we can put measures in place to provide positive influence and make sure they do it is being viewed safely. Dr Anderson highlights that it also offers the chance for the wider media community to promote positive help-seeking among young people and their families.

"We really encourage those advertising the show beyond Netflix, like journalists and reviewers, to take the opportunity to promote these resources in addition to providing warnings about the topics it depicts."

"What we want to do is reach young people wherever they are, through every channel they are using, so they know that even if they are feeling very troubled and hopeless about their situation, there is always help available."

# IMPROVING LITERACY AND NUMERACY

**ADVICE FOR PARENTS OF YEAR 10 STUDENTS** 

February 2018 update

A minimum standard of literacy and numeracy is required for your child to receive their Higher School Certificate (HSC).



Meeting the HSC minimum standard will mean that your child has the literacy and numeracy skills that are essential for success in learning and life after school.

#### THE ONLINE TESTS

Most students will show they have met the HSC minimum standard by passing minimum standard online tests. Students master basic skills at different stages so there are **multiple opportunities** available to pass the tests, from Year 10 until a few years after Year 12.



There are three 45-minute online tests:

- a multiple choice reading test
- a multiple choice numeracy test
- a short **writing** test based on a choice between a visual or written prompt

#### **2017 NAPLAN TESTS**

If your child achieved Band 8s or above in one or more of the 2017 Year 9 NAPLAN tests they are recognised as having met the HSC minimum standard in that area/s and will not need to sit the corresponding online test/s.
