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New HSC Timetable

All HSC students will get the opportunity to complete their studies in 2021, with the full complement of HSC exams to go ahead from 9 November 2021.



The NSW Education Standards Authority (NESA) has issued a revised timetable, with 110 exams taking place over 19 days, ending on 3 December.

Students will receive their ATARs on 20 January 2022, with their HSC results released on 24 January.

Strict COVID safe protocols supported by NSW Health will be in place to protect students, exam supervisors and school staff when HSC exams start on 9 November 2021.

The protocols for a COVID-safe HSC require exam supervisors to be fully vaccinated and strongly encourage eligible HSC students to receive two vaccine doses before exams start.

Other safety measures include:

- Mandatory face masks for students and staff, indoors and outdoors
- Check-in and health screening protocols for students and staff
- Physical distancing between students and staff at all times
- Minimising mingling of student groups
- Keeping exam group sizes as small as possible
- Desks spaced a minimum of 1.5 metres apart and exam rooms well ventilated
- Hygiene marshals and regular cleaning of exam rooms.

An illness and misadventure process will be available for students who are unable to attend an exam due to having a positive COVID-19 test result, or being a close contact.

According to the HSC Enrolment Snapshot which will be released by NESA on Monday 68,710 students are on track to receive the HSC in 2021.

Cooler Classrooms - Cool for School

We are very excited to tell you that Grafton High School now has fully installed and operational Cooler Classrooms equipment, thanks to the NSW government investment of more than \$500 million dollars over five years to improve indoor comfort and air quality in public schools around the state.

Our school has installed two new air conditioning units – in our Textiles room and an upstairs classroom in A Block. Reverse-cycle air conditioning will now keep these learning spaces comfortable during hot summers and chilly winters while fans and fresh air ventilation systems maintain healthy air quality.

To increase energy awareness and keep running costs low, smart outdoor weather monitors linked to interactive control systems are installed. These enable students and teachers to make energy efficient decisions to improve classroom comfort.

By creating healthy and comfortable learning environments at our school, our students can focus on what matters – learning.



We know that our physical environments can affect us, our productivity and our ability to learn and develop. Improving indoor classroom environments and comfort can contribute to improved learning outcomes.



Write a Book in a Day

Write a Book in a Day is a fun, creative and collaborative competition for students in years 5 to 12. Teams have twelve hours to write and illustrate a book from start to finish. Students are provided with a unique set of parameters, which must be included in the story. Digital editions of the completed stories are then made available on the Online Library and shared with hospitals across Australia, providing reading material for children undergoing cancer treatment.



This year, Grafton High School participated for the second year with 8 students completing the competition virtually via zoom during lockdown. Despite being placed under unique difficulties, Nadia Smith, Sienna Eastment, Mae Carroll, Sienna Connell, Leni Rush, Lotte Pereira, Melinda Mifsud and Grace Kennedy successfully completed a 25 page book in the 12 hours titled: "Shipwrecked" which tells the story of 3 people that become stranded on an island off the coast of Australia and realise there's more to life than fame and fortune.

All funds raised through sponsorship go towards The Kids' Cancer Project, a national charity supporting childhood cancer research. So far this year, the competition has raised over \$540,000, which directly funds scientific research to find better treatments and ultimately a cure for childhood cancer. Ex-GHS Student Wins Scholarship

The scholarship is worth \$5000 dollars a year over three years, with funding provided through the NSW Department of Education. Applicants must be active in an approved apprenticeship at the time of being awarded the Scholarship.

The aim of the Bert Evans Apprentice Scholarships is to assist NSW apprentices who have experienced hardship in their life to successfully complete their apprenticeship. The objectives of this program are to:



- support apprentices to progress through to completion of their chosen trade calling
- encourage more apprentices to achieve their goals and make a valuable contribution to their local communities
- invest in individual development to support employment outcomes

The scholarships are named in honour of the late NSW Apprenticeship Ambassador and patron of the NSW Training Awards, Mr Bert Evans AO, in recognition of his outstanding support for vocational education and training and for apprentices in New South Wales.
