FROM THE PRINCIPAL'S DESK

We reach the halfway point of the year, and while there have been many positives to report from Term 2, the first topic I'd like to address in this newsletter is the staffing challenges we have experienced this term, which have significantly impacted students and staff. Unplanned leave from staff for sickness and other reasons beyond their control was significantly higher than our long-term average for most of this term, which combined with previously planned leave such as parental leave, and continuing limited availability of casual staff on a day-to-day basis, meant that we had many classes revert to supervision instead of teaching and learning. This has clearly been disappointing for all of us, and I have spent much of this term actively seeking additional staff, working with NSW DoE recruitment supports to recruit further quality temporary and permanent staff, while also working internally with our team to workshop what could be done to help the situation. A key part of my role as Principal is to recruit quality teachers and staff who can positively impact student learning, and maintain the standards expected for those currently employed. Despite recruitment progress being frustratingly slow at times, I take this responsibility very seriously.

As we head into Term 3, I am relieved to report that we will have four of our permanent staff return from long term leave, and two new permanent staff begin. We are still actively recruiting staff for our support faculty, and continue advertising for relief staff which we plan to employ on contract. As a result of the increase in the number of staff, I am expecting that in Term 3 and 4 we will not see a repeat of the level of disruption experienced this term. Merged classes combined for supervision may be used on occasions due to unusually busy days or major excursions occurring in particular period of time, but I expect that this once again becomes the exception, and not the norm, as we have experienced recently.

Our timetable is structured so that almost all subjects are afforded significantly more hours than required by NSW Education Standards Authority across the year, and so with an improvement in our staffing as I expect we will see, classes will still have the required time across the year to cover each curriculum, albeit with teachers adjusting their programs to cater for the lessons lost that they would have planned for. I am grateful to our students for enduring the disruption with such respect, to our staff for going above and beyond what is expected of them on site each day, and to our families for trusting that we were taking the situation seriously and actively trying to address it.

Beyond the above, I'd like to acknowledge a couple of retirements from our staff here. Lyndall Reardon is now on leave pending retirement after 33 years of teaching here at Grafton High School. There are generations of students and families that have benefited from her work, and I thank her for her contribution to education. Shirley Kelly will retire at the end of this term, after fulfilling multiple different administration roles in her 27 years here. The work of people such as Shirley is often unseen and undervalued, but she has been a key part of our team that makes this school tick along each and every day. Thank you, Shirley.

I wish all our students, staff and families a safe and happy school holiday period, and we look forward to getting into our teaching and learning in Terms 3 and 4 with renewed purpose and motivation.







Celebrating Student Success at our Award Presentation Assembly


On Thursday 26 June, Grafton High School held a special Award Presentation Assembly to recognise and celebrate the outstanding achievements of our students throughout the semester.


